& Nautical Word &

Baggywinkle: is a soft covering for cables (or any other obstructions) to reduce sail chafe. There are many points in the rig of a large sailing ship where the sails come into contact with the standing rigging; unprotected sails would soon develop holes at the points of contact. Baggywrinkle provides a softer wearing surface for the sail.

Baggywrinkle is made from short pieces of yarn cut from old lines that have been taken out of service. Two parallel lengths of marline are stretched between fixed points, and the lengths of yarn are attached using a hitch - similar to a cow hitch - called a "railroad sennit". This creates a long, shaggy fringe which, when the marline is wound around a cable, becomes a large hairy cylinder. (Cited from Wikipedia.)

Plans for reorganizing the Collection storage area have been put on hold due to the lack of manpower and a limited budget. We are hoping to complete the task of organizing artifacts before the New Year.

We are currently working on a new exhibit space. This new space will be dedicated to educating young visitors about the Chesapeake region, Native Americans, the English settlers, watermen, boat building and more! At the moment the plans for this space are in the beginning stages. The proposed idea is to fabricate a "boat" to contain the space. Kids will be able to walk up a gang plank into the boat to explore and discover many activities. Some of these activities include: a boat wheel and bell for them to play with; a dress up area so kids can be a sailor or a waterman; a television with educational videos which correspond to our exhibits; puzzles, discovery boxes, a felt board with different shapes allowing children to create maritime scenes; and a small library filled with children's books related to our mission, such as boat building for kids and Chesapeake Bay books.

& Thesapeake Wooden Boat Building School &

The Boat School started the new semester fulfilling a promise made some time ago. Joe Squires, the builder who finished the new upper level of the Museum as well as the new Boat School, offered to lower the final bill for the Boat School by \$5,000 if we would restore an old boat of his. In September, Ned Colburn and his crew completed the boat – a St. Lawrence skiff estimated to be over 100 years old – and returned it to Joe, fulfilling our part of the agreement.

The fall semester started and we have a total of 24 students. One of our new projects will be a lapstrake ultra-light boat. We haven't built one in quite a while, so it will be a learning experience for the new folks.

The Grady-White which we were restoring for Jack Bosen was returned to him during the summer. It was a wooden lapstrake boat built in the early 1960's and will be used in Georgia.

The Boat School has new T-shirts for sale. Ernie Dubble and his daughter came up with a revision of the design we have been using for many years. It simplifies the old design and makes it "less busy"!

We have just returned from our annual trip to St. Michaels for the Mid-Atlantic Small Craft Festival. More than 30 folks from the Boat School showed up at the weekend event, and had a wonderful time. The weather started out great, and some of the early attendees spent several good days on the water, but the front came thru Saturday afternoon and the weather became cold and windy. Ken Price came back from Washington State to join us, and Chris and Kay Wilson had the inaugural launch of their sailboat that they built at the school. Joe Manning and others provided a camp feast Saturday evening, and Al Ault caned away the weekend. Joe Manning received an award for his 1915 Old Town canoe, and Ron Blackwell and his wife were recognized by the Mid-Atlantic Small Craft Association for their many years of support to that group.
