From the President's Desk...

Dear Friends,

After moving to Havre de Grace in July 2011, I decided to volunteer at the Maritime Museum. I was still working in my consulting practice, and thought volunteering would help ground me in the community. Little did I foresee that I would immediately be elected as Treasurer and then, fifteen months later, as President. It has been rewarding for me personally; new friendships, amazing volunteers, a strong and engaged Board of Directors. It has also been a great segue as I phased down my consulting practice and employed my managerial skills; I could share and explore my interest in things maritime and my passion for the environment.

I am proud of what our amazing teams of volunteers, staff, members, donors, grantors, and program partners have accomplished. It has been an honor to serve, and has been among the most rewarding (although sometimes most frustrating) experiences in my life. Last year, I advised the Board of Directors that I needed to step down as President, and that we needed to hire an Executive Director with excellent managerial skills. Gary Foster, a board member and active volunteer with whom I worked closely on Museum projects, stepped up. Our board voted him as our new President, effective March 1st. I will stay on as Vice President, and assist our new leadership team in taking over the day-to-day management and longer-term programming of the Museum. Jean Johnson was voted in as our new Secretary and officer of the corporation. We also recently hired our new Director, Mary Leavens.

Additionally, we have reorganized the Environmental Center. Sarah Shpak decided that teaching was her passion, so she will now be our Environmental Educator, primarily focusing on our summer camps and related programming. Sarah remains an active volunteer. Logan Poore, a recent graduate of Salisbury University, was hired as our Environmental Project Coordinator. He is creating two new exhibits for our Environmental Center gallery, installing an osprey cam in our new osprey nest, and will be project lead overseeing our new waterfront/riparian restoration project, under a \$35,508 grant that we were just awarded from the Chesapeake Bay Trust.

We also formally established working committees chaired by either a board member or a senior staff person, to oversee and implement our business plan. I will continue chairing two of those, our Exhibits and Environmental Center Committees. We have fifteen exhibits under development - some large, some small. As these are completed, we will announce them on social media. I am pleased with the leadership team that we have built, and confident that they will continue to grow into their new roles.

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I have asked Gary, Mary, Logan, and Jean to prepare brief introductions in this newsletter. I am sure that you will be hearing more from them.

Our New Secretary - Jean Johnson

Jean Montgomery Johnson is a former librarian who, after retiring from Lehigh University, chose to return to her hometown of Havre de Grace, after many years of residing in Bethlehem, Pennsylvania. Her daughter is a novelist in Oregon, and her son a nurse in Tennessee. Corvallis, Oregon, her "second home," is where her two grandsons live.

Our New Murals

On October 4, 2017, a sunny Wednesday afternoon, we revealed our own bold new art initiative - these colorful murals painted by internationally recognized Philadelphia artist Paul Santoleri.

Installed on the Museum's exterior walls, *Windward Trim* is a three-panel painting of colorful and fanciful images of ships, nautical instruments and sea and air creatures. "I tried to make a piece that was both responsive and sensitive to the architecture of the building, yet added a new layer of life that might reveal and inform about the building's exhibits and programs," Santoleri explained. Known for his large-scale murals, he has traveled the world to create artworks that engage their communities through whimsy and imagination. His art includes works commissioned in Paris, Brazil and Edinburgh. Santoleri's work is well-known on walls throughout Philadelphia. He did extensive research for a composition that would communicate with the audience who would live with the artwork.

In the first panel, a ship's deck is exposed to the wind and waves. In the second panel, a huge crab dominates the foreground of a marine world beneath the waves. The third panel combines a sextant and pulleys with an image common to those living on the waterfront, but startling to others: a large osprey flying overhead while clutching a fish in its talons.

The resulting artwork conveys buoyancy and movement through the use of changing perspectives. See the next page for photos of the process!

New Exhibits

Over the last few months we have installed several new exhibits. Our Boat Shop crew completed a partial renovation of an early 20th century (circa 1930s) wooden single-person racing shell for display. It is handsomely displayed in the rafters of our main gallery. Harford Community College student Paule Audebert conducted extensive research on an historic and evolutionary ship design, the Baltimore Clipper, and its importance in the founding of our county and the growth of our economy. A model of the Baltimore Clipper and a summary of her study are on display in our main gallery. Twelve artifacts from our collection, along with a model of a Chesapeake Bay "Deadrise" commercial fishing boat, are now on display in our reception area and gift shop.

Finally, we will be opening our Environmental Center gallery to the general public on or about April 1st, without docent supervision (as was the case previously). These exhibits include two Chesapeake Bay fish tanks and two digital interactive exhibits on the environmentally sensitive (at risk) wildlife and plants in the Upper Chesapeake Bay. You can see the results of last year's survey and monitoring of the Submerged Aquatic Vegetation (SAV) in the Susquehanna Flats, conducted by our Environmental Center staff and volunteers. There is also a disturbing poster and graphic folk display on the global problem of plastics in the marine environment. An informative and thought-provoking series of six posters on our local watershed accompanies it. Many of you may have noticed that the Baltimore Gas and Electric Company donated and installed (at our request) a 45-foot pole topped with an osprey nesting platform on the Museum grounds. We are currently working to mount a camera above the nest and livestream images to a monitor in our reception area. Hopefully, a pair will claim the nest in early March. We are excited.

Our Programs and Classes

Our lecture series and monthly environmental film series (in collaboration with the HdG Green Team) have been very well received. Our Programs Committee is lining up new lectures on a variety of topics of local and regional interest, and there are films to be shown in the queue. In the coming months we will be lining up musicians for our 2018 summer concert series. We have now begun to include old-time Blues, Bluegrass, and Celtic music alongside our traditional folk concerts. We hope to have Miss Sue (Capp) back again this summer for our Thursday morning children's story and craft time. Abe Spergel and Bruce Pringle from the Coast Guard Auxiliary are returning to teach our boating safety and navigation classes.



Oars for Art

The Museum is excited to work in collaboration with the Philadelphia Sculptors, and invites artists who work in 3D media to put their oars in the water and participate in a creative repurposing of maritime artifacts. The Maritime Museum has long served as a repository for abandoned, forgotten, and neglected wooden oars and paddles. No longer attached to rowboats, canoes, or kayaks, they have lost their identity and purpose. Selected artists will breathe new life into these artifacts by transforming them into artworks. During July and August 2018, the resulting creations will be exhibited in various indoor locations and storefronts in the commercial center of Havre de Grace and its environs, before being returned to the Museum in September for a final exhibition and auction, to benefit both the Museum and artists.
